## One Class and You May Be Hooked—Working as a Rice Foundation Intern

What started out to be one class to get my feet wet after a 20 year break from school evolved into two paid internship positions and a term as assistant to the Cuyamaca College Botanical Society (CCBS) Board. The first class that I took was Fundamentals of Ornamental Horticulture. I was hooked on the plant world and had to learn more of what had been a hobby of trial and error in my yard for years.

My work in the floral field involved caring for the plants, maintaining the field and purchasing plants. It sounded like fun to me, though I knew all I could bring to the table was my trial and error methods - a little water, some fertilizer and the hope that the flowers would thrive.

I soon found out that Brad's fundamentals class would pay off. I killed my first plants, and I was devastated. In my defense, once I "dug a little deeper," I found they were finicky plants.

Working in the nursery meant I'd have to be somewhat knowledgeable to be able to help the customers. With only one class behind me, I suddenly felt the urgency to learn something, anything, quickly. So, I started asking a lot of

questions, and I'm sure my fellow students can attest to this. They all graciously encouraged my eagerness to learn, which is one reason I like this department so much.

Robin Rushmore, the previous floral field manager, and Viva Dorado, our new CCBS President, strongly encouraged me to take the Annuals and Perennials class next, and I begrudgingly took their advice. Enjoying the subject wasn't the issue; it was being diligent with memorization. Much to my amazement I did very well in the class!

My experience as an intern has been enjoyable and invaluable. Though the work is challenging, the camaraderie makes learning so inviting. I've spoken with other interns in the department, and they all share my gratitude for the support and experience they have obtained through this program.

## Gardening Under Mediterranean Skies V—Save the Date!

Gardening Under Mediterranean Skies V is scheduled for September 29-30 in San Diego. Titled Lessons In Our Gardens – San Diego, the event is sponsored by Pacific Horticulture magazine, in association with Quail Botanical Gardens, Garden Design magazine, the San Diego Horticultural Society, the Mediterranean Garden Society, and The Water Conservation Garden. The Cuyamaca College Ornamental Horticulture Department is another of the sponsors of this inspiring symposium.

The weekend celebrates plants that thrive with minimal care in San Diego's Mediterranean climate and showcases the wide range of garden possibilities in a low-water environment. It includes keynote talks at Quail, followed by visits to four excitingly different gardens for a combination tour and on-site lecture by the experts who designed them.

Participants will visit a garden with dozens of California native plant species and another designed to attract birds and butterflies all year long. A third garden, pictured here in a photo by Debra Lee Baldwin (from her book *Designing with Succulents*, Timber Press, 2007), has a world-class collection of succulents in a gracious setting. The fourth garden features a huge range of plant material – a real collector's treasure.

One talk at Quail, on sustainable landscaping, will be by award-winning Santa Barbara landscape architect Owen E. Dell. The second Quail talk features Shirley Kerins, an award-winning

Pasadena-based landscape architect and former curator of the Huntington Botanical Gardens herb garden, who will speak on exceptional plants for Mediterranean-climate gardens.

The event includes tours of Quail Botanical Gardens, plant sales, and book signings. A box lunch will be enjoyed each day in one of the gardens, and there will be an evening reception at Quail on Sept. 29.

On September 28 there will be two special garden tours at The Water Conservation Garden at Cuyamaca College, plus two free talks there. Michael Buckner will give a talk about and a tour of the Cactus and Succulent Garden, and Don Schultz will give a talk on "Mediterranean Landscape Style for a Low Maintenance Lifestyle."

Registration is \$155, and includes 2 lunches, a free book, and a 1-year subscription to Pacific Horticulture magazine. After Sept. 1 fees go up by \$30. To register, go to [www.sdhortsoc.org](http://www.sdhortsoc.org) or call (760) 295-7089.
