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***Got Plans?***

In conjunction with Cuyamaca College's High School & Community Relations (Outreach) department, the East County Education Alliance held the annual Got Plans? College and Career Fair at Cuyamaca College on Saturday, October 8. Approximately 4,500 attendees came to learn about prospective paths for the future. More than 150 groups participated to offer information to students on options for life-after-high school. Representatives from public and private colleges and universities from California and across the nation, vocational schools, career agencies, and the military were on hand to answer questions and interact with students. Over 30 departments from Cuyamaca and Grossmont Colleges participated in the event, including a heavy presence from the CTE areas. Our Financial Aid and Counseling departments offered workshops to students on transfer options and financial assistance. Both Outreach departments from Cuyamaca and Grossmont teamed up to offer a workshop on the steps to apply to the district and alumni from the college's CTE areas held a panel to talk to students about their experience. Community agencies such as Cal Fire and the San Diego County Sheriff's Departments also participated and set up recruiting booths.



### ***Cuyamaca College Awarded \$6 million STEM Grant for Hispanic Serving Institutions***

Cuyamaca College has been awarded a five-year, federal grant totaling nearly \$6 million to boost the number of science, technology, engineering and mathematics graduates who transfer to the California State University and University of California systems. The college will receive nearly \$1.2 million annually for the next five years through the U.S. Department of Education's Hispanic-Serving Institutions STEM and Articulation Program. Hispanic Serving Institutions are colleges or universities where Hispanics make up at least 25 percent of the school's full-time equivalent students and that have adopted strategies to help low-income and Latino students. Nearly one in three students at Cuyamaca College is Latino, almost half of whom are low income and first-generation college students. Cuyamaca College was one of 38 colleges and universities nationwide who will be receiving a Hispanic Serving Institutions STEM grant.

Tuesday, September 27, Cuyamaca College was the first community college in the San Diego area to host a **Link2Tech** event coordinated by the San Diego Regional Economic Development Council. The first Link2Tech/Link2Cyber event was held at San Marcos in the spring of 2016.

More than 120 high school students attended the event and listened intently as Christopher Memmott, Founder and CEO of Vault RMS, Máximo Escobedo, Art Director at Salk Institute for Biological Studies, and Mark Siemers, an instructor at DevBootcamp, shared their employment journeys with the successes and detours along the way. Curtis Sharon, director of Cuyamaca's CISCO Academy, moderated the discussion which was interspersed with questions from the audience. Following the discussion, students swarmed the panel, seeking answers to questions about their personal passions and visions.


