


President's Report to the Governing Board September 11, 2018

Welcome Week

Center for Water Studies Moves into New Home



Don Jones, our resident veteran water industry professional, is overseeing the transition of Cuyamaca College's Water and Wastewater Technology program into the Center for Water Studies. Among the premier water and wastewater training facilities in California, the Center for Water Studies relocated in late August to a renovated complex complete with new classrooms, a water quality analysis laboratory and a workshop for back flow, cross-connection controls, and related skills-based courses. The complex sits next to a state-of-the-art field operations skills yard that opened in January, with an above-ground water distribution system and an underground wastewater collection system. The facility aims to simulate the challenges that students will face on the job in advanced water and

wastewater facilities. An official dedication ceremony for the new complex is tentatively set for January.

CC Impact



Earlier this semester Student Services staff put a name to the efforts and interactions employees have with the students they come in contact with on a daily basis. A contest was held, and the name "CC Impact" was selected by a majority vote. Cathy Fritz, Student Services Specialist, was the staff member who came up with the name. She was presented a gift certificate by Dr. Jessica Robinson, Vice President of Student Services, along with a cupcake celebration for student services employees. CC Impact is the name of a philosophy, not a program, which we have adopted to refer to moments in our work which involve the helping of our students.
