Two Cuyamaca College students, Valorie Glasser and Benjamin Hart (pictured second from left and second from right, respectively), have been named to the Phi Theta Kappa All-California Academic Team and were among some of the top community college students in the state attending a March 25 awards luncheon in Sacramento. Valorie, who has a 4.0 GPA while majoring in physics and mathematics, has been committed to pursuing her doctorate in physics since the age of 13. She engaged in research at the Fermi National Accelerator Laboratory near Chicago during the summer of 2018, collaborating on a project developing new detector systems



for muon tomography in homeland security. Currently, she works as a physics tutor at Cuyamaca College. She's also an accomplished musician. After being involved with classical piano for more than 12 years, she has recently taken up voice lessons and sings in the Grossmont Master Chorale. Valorie, 21, is a first-generation college student and will be transferring this fall to a four-year institution. Benjamin, who has a 3.97 GPA while majoring in automotive technology, is the father of four beautiful children and husband to a wonderful wife. Understanding electricity and electrical components has always fascinated Benjamin, and his long-term goal is to earn a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering. He is a very driven individual who hopes to own his businesses in the not-too-distant future. Biology Class Creates Seed Bombs



In order to tie their photosynthesis unit to plants more directly in Biology 130, Instructor Crystal Schalmo had the students make seed "bombs" out of clay, potting soil and native seeds. They talked about the importance of local plants and habitat and how they can take responsibility for beautifying their own neighborhoods by planting native plants. The seed bombs were a good way to do this. The students enjoyed the hands-on activities so much that Crystal has decided to continue doing this every semester in her Biology 130 class.



A World to Explore in Earth Science Disciplines



It's been a busy semester in the Earth Science Disciplines this spring at Cuyamaca College. The Earth Science Program encompasses geology, oceanography and geography and are centered on understanding how the earth functions as a system. An integral component of Earth Science is being able to apply what students learn in the classroom to the field environment. Each semester all courses integrate field trips to local San Diego County sites to give students that first-hand experience. For the first time in 10 years, a class fully centered on the learning in the field environment was offered. The course, GEOL/GEOG 122 Regional Field Studies of Desert Environments, gave the student the opportunity to learn about geology and geography in Joshua Tree National Park and the Laguna Mountains. Students investigated the regional

history of plate tectonics and how tectonics shaped the landscapes that we see today, the desert features of the Mojave and Sonoran Deserts, how to identify rocks and minerals, and how humans have influenced the region. The students gained a better understanding of how to learn and research in a field environment while also developing an appreciation of regional Southern California geologic history. Students taking the courses that are primarily based in the classroom will also have the opportunity to learn in the field this semester. Oceanography classes will explore nearshore processes at Sunset Cliffs, intertidal zonation at Cabrillo National Monument, and marine life at Birch Aquarium. Geology classes will explore local geology and landscape development at Mission Trails Regional Park and Torrey Pines State Reserve, and the geologic history of San Diego County at the Natural History Museum. Geography classes have already taken field trips to Mission Trails to explore the local geology and geography.

Middle Eastern Heritage Month

Middle Eastern Heritage Month came to Cuyamaca College in April with a menu of cultural events highlighted by an all-day Syriac House Exhibition and an afternoon theatrical performance of storytelling and music reminiscent of a historic Baghdad coffee house. The Syriac House was held on Wednesday, April 3, on the second floor of the Student Center. Art, antiques and collectibles were on display. The presentation was hosted by the Middle Eastern Students Club and sponsored by Cuyamaca College's Student Affairs, Engagement & Equity, Associated Student Government and Our Mother of Perpetual Help Syriac Catholic Church.











Another highlight of the month is *Khan Jghan*, scheduled for April 24 from 12:30 to 2:00 p.m. in the Samuel M. Ciccati Theatre. *Khan Jghan* is said to have been the first coffee house in Baghdad in the early 20th century, and it would grow into a popular local gathering place, a

place that hosted a storyteller named Al-Qasakhoon, who was considered a celebrity because of his ability to entertain people for hours and guide them with words of wisdom. *Khan Jghan* will include musicians, storytelling, and more in a setting reminiscent of the historic coffee house.
