Cuyamaca College's Phi Theta Kappa Induction Ceremony

Pack the Pantry Huge Success

Cuyamaca College participated in the first-ever local Pack the Pantry food drive to fight student hunger on local college campuses and exceeded all expectations, raising enough food and financial donations to provide over 50,000 meals to area students. California Coast Credit Union partnered with the San Diego Food Bank and local community colleges to launch the Pack the Pantry food drive, which ran from November 4 to November 18. Food donation bins were placed at all Cal Coast branches and on all local community college campuses. Research shows that around 50% of college students in San Diego face food insecurity, which means they don't have reliable, consistent



access to food. In response to the growing concern, virtually every local college has established a food pantry.

Grand Re-Opening of Student Center

The grand re-opening of Cuyamaca College's renovated Student Center included the first look at the new Veterans Center on the first floor that brings all veterans-related services under one roof. For the estimated 300 veterans enrolled at the college, the new center promises to be a home away from home. With nearly 2,500 square feet, the new center nearly triples the amount of space previously available for veteran services. A major improvement is being able to provide the tracking, bookkeeping and certification required for VA benefits, and to serve the unique needs of student veterans and their dependents in a central location. With a state grant funding a Veterans Center coordinator, new computers, a food pantry for veterans and their families, a textbook library, and school supply kits, the Veterans Center plans to expand its outreach and services.
