

## Service Opportunity for Dr. Josh Franco



Professor Josh Franco has been selected to serve as the Faculty lead for the statewide Course Identification (C-ID) Faculty Discipline Review Group (FDRG) for Political Science. The Course Identification Numbering System is initiating its five-year review of all descriptors associated with political science. C-ID is a supranumbering systems designed to ease transfer and articulation in California higher education institutions.

Dr. Franco will play a key role in ensuring descriptors are current and reflect changes in the field that would necessarily impact curriculum and will provide input on the

revision of elements of descriptors that are deemed problematic. "This is a significant service opportunity, given that it only occurs every five years and can lead to technical and substantive changes to the transfer model curriculum of political science," said Franco. "I am really excited to serve in this role."

# Outreach to Begin for Bachelor of Arts in Public Administration – WaterWorks Management Degree Pathway

In an effort to meet the growing workforce needs in water and wastewater technology, Cuyamaca College and National University have entered into a partnership to develop and articulate clear academic pathways to support degree completion for students in the field of water. The collaboration establishes a mutually beneficial pathway for students completing their transfer associate degree at Cuyamaca College in WaterWorks Management to transfer into National University's Public Administration baccalaureate degree program. Administrative leaders at both organizations have begun working on collaborative efforts to market the opportunity to existing Cuyamaca College students in the WaterWorks Management program, and are also working on a website and marketing materials to recruit new students.
